

We'll do lunch together, work hard from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and end the day with some fine harmony! Weren't The Allies great at our last meeting!


Plan now to attend! Let our District Secretary know now that you're coming...or wait until you get his formal invitation.

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The Birth of Another Successful Barbershop Youth Program

When I was 14 years old I went to a show by the Southern Gateway Chorus. It was the 10th Gateway Show I had seen. I told my dad, "I want to do that." The next year I joined. Now I was a "babyshopper!" I loved hanging out with the older guys and seeing how the older guys did things – older guys like The Cincinnati Kids, The Rapscallions and the Roaring 20's.

My school friends didn't understand what I saw in barbershop, and I didn't know how to show them. We had football camp, baseball camp, wrestling camp, band camp, and drama camp, but no barbershop camp.

Years later I sang in a quartet called Desperado. We had the opportunity to do a Harmony Explosion Camp in Massachusetts. Wow! A barbershop camp! A few years later we got to work with the Buckeye Harmony Camp. I wondered why we couldn't have something similar in my hometown.

About 3 years ago I asked the Southern Gateway president, Jeff Legters, "Why can't we do a festival for the kids?" It's all about money. Another friend, Jason Remley, was directing the **Seven Hills SAI chorus** as well as singing with my quartet, YouBet! I asked him about Seven Hills doing a high school festival. Again it was all about the money. I was coaching the **Queen City SAI chorus**. I asked them – money!

OK. If no one of the choruses could afford a festival, maybe all three choruses – along with our friends, **The Delta Kings** – might be able to pull it off. Well, after forming a team with members from each of the 4 choruses, we got to work.

After about 2 years of planning, on June 23rd and 24th, the first annual Greater Cincinnati Harmony Festival took place at Northern Kentucky University. About 40 girls and 17 boys formed 2 choruses under the direction of

The PR Toolbox







Why should your chapter have a bulletin?

Does your chapter have a monthly bulletin? There are eight very good reasons for your chapter to have a bulletin.

- 1. Inform of coming events.
- 2. Record recent barbershop events.
- 3. Reflect views of chapter officers and members as to chapter well-being.
- 4. Recognize efforts and accomplishments of members and others.
- 5. Educate about chapter, district, and Society aims and goals, about various aspects of singing craft and about events and actions that shape the future of barbershopping.
- 6. Promote barbershopping in general, together with chapter, division, district and Society events and programs.
- Recruit by encouraging members to bring guests, supporting membership drives, and publicizing guest and new members.
- 8. Encourage pride and participation in our hobby and Society.

And collectively, these reasons add up to great internal PR. Permit me to share a brief story with you.

When I joined the Mansfield Chapter in April of 2000, they hadn't had a bulletin for a number of years. I was asked to resurrect the bulletin, which I did. I would like to think that my editorship was the catalyst, but in any event, the bulletin began to create a sense of community within the chapter. Articles from the president of the chapter, the music director, the VP of membership and other board members began to spread the leadership philosophy among members. Support for the bulletin increased and folks began to look forward to the Chordsmen Chronicle being distributed on the first Monday of each month.

As the VP for M&PR for the chapter, I also began to send the bulletin to other chapters that expressed an interest. It's called bulletin exchange. The Society, the local media, and the convention center are also on the mailing list. Yes, we publish in hard copy. Why, you ask?

We publish in hard copy and mail those that are not picked up on a Monday night. Comments from the rest of the member's family indicate that they enjoy reading it and may not if the bulletin was only on the computer. Many wives of the members look forward to reading it, so I'm told. So the long story short version is that a monthly bulletin is a good thing for the chapter. If I may brag a moment, when I won the JAD BETY the first time the chapter was elated. It kind of put Mansfield back on the map. When I placed third in the International Bulletin Contest in 2004 the chapter was even more excited. And this year, as the IBC winner, the chapter was ecstatic.

So I speak from experience on the value of a monthly chapter bulletin. But as Paul Harvey would say, "here's the rest of the story."

I encourage each chapter to not only have a monthly bulletin, but to enter it in the Johnny Appleseed Bulletin Editor of the Year (JAD BETY) competition. The judge's comments are most helpful in making the bulletin better. A chapter bulletin is of great value to the chapter. (See items 1 thru 8 above.) And remember...It's great internal PR.

If I can be of assistance in helping you get a bulletin started or answer questions about improvement, please contact me. I'm more than willing to help.


Kirk's Corner

Improvisations are great. Ones that have been fun recently at chapter meetings are: "What happens if it is the coldest night of the year, and heat in the meeting hall breaks down at your chapter meeting." "A Corny Song." "A bad marching band." "A scene from American history." "A misbehaving chorus." Include everybody in the improvisation. Can include singing, even barbershop, but need not. 10 minutes to prepare. Groups of 6-12 seem to do best for most improvs. Divide up your group.

irector burnout? In a previous issue, I wrote a Director's Meditation with some ideas for getting your head straight to make directing a pleasure instead of a frustration. One point was to avoid lecturing or criticizing the chorus. Some subtle ways of criticizing are stopping the song, wincing, and lifting your shoulder in the vain hope that your shoulder can raise the pitch. One way to avoid lecturing is to limit your instructions to one sentence. And not a run-on sentence, either. A tip is to listen and watch for spirit and energy, not technical stuff. Be a cheerleader, not a scolding teacher. I am a happier director now.

Your weekly chapter meeting is the most important performance you'll make. Give it some thought, planning, and teamwork. Is it guest-friendly? Happy? Fast-moving? Lots of faces and hands out front? Enjoy.

Greater Pittsburgh Chapter News

You might think that all the noise, excitement, and activity that occurs at any major amusement park would not lend itself to a barbershop performance. WRONG! Adding to the chorus performances, five quartets took to the stage. Quartets performing included "ROMEO" (retired old men entertaining others) from Pittsburgh North Hills chapter, the "Unforgettables" form Pittsburgh South Hills chapter and the "Melodaires" from the Greater Pittsburgh chapter. The "Melodaires" were outfitted in Mickey Mouse ears (we think they thought they were in Disney World). There was a quartet form the Sweet Adeline group, but I somehow missed their name (sorry). The total show ended

with a terrific performance by JAD's own, "Hot Air Buffoons" who were getting ready for

the International Convention at Indianapolis.

Local barbershopper takes first in international contest

LEXINGTON - R. F. 'Bob' Miller, local Lexington resident and member of the Fun Center Chordsmen Barbershop Harmony Chorus was awarded the prestigious first place plaque in the Barbershop Harmony Society's International Bulletin Contest (IBC). Miller received the award July 6, at the Barbershop Harmony Society's annual international chorus, quartet and bulletin competition in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Miller is the bulletin editor of the Chordsmen Chronicle, the monthly news letter of the Fun Center Chordsmen, the Mansfield chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society. Each year in April, the Johnny Appleseed District (JAD) of the Society presents a Bulletin

Editor of the Year (BETY) award to the editor who, according to certified judges, publishes the best series of bulletins for their chapter. This competition is open to any of the 58 chapters in the JAD. The award is based on the bulletins published during the previous calendar year.

In April of 2006, the JAD BETY was awarded to Miller who then qualified to advance to the International Bulletin Contest whose entries include the best two bulletins in each of the 16 district competitions.

Winning has become a tradition for Miller who was awarded the Johnny Appleseed District Bulletin Editor of the Year in 2001, 2003, 2004 and 2005 and placed third in the IBC in 2005.

The Fun Center Chordsmen Barbershop Harmony Chorus, under the direction of Steve Kovach, has members from many communities in the area including Lexington, Mansfield, Shelby, Bellville, Marion, Galion, Fredericktown and Ashland. They meet at 7:00 p.m. every Monday night at the First Congregational Church at the corner of Marion Ave. and Millsboro Rd. All men who like to sing, regardless of age, are welcome to visit. JAD Close to Turning the Corner

s has been pointed out (repeatedly) in this column, the Society, including JAD, has seen a consistent drop in membership for many years. sure that is what we need. More and more chapters are trying this program and some are having very good success. If you run the pro-

gram fully and attend to all the details it is bound to bring your chapter new members. If your chapter decides to use this JAD original, you can call me for assistance (513-423-4361) and I'll give you as much help as I can. If you're not too far away I'll try to visit you.

If you don't want to run the yard sign program, please run a recruiting campaign of your own and let me know how it works. I guarantee I'll copy it and/or incorporate it into the yard sign program. Gentlemen, autumn is prime recruitment time so don't let the opportunity slip away. Talk it over with your Chapter President and Membership VP.

But bringing in new members is not the only way to swell our ranks. Middletown found that contacting EX-MEMBERS who dropped out as far back as 20 years ago was productive. Remember, if they were interested and active at one time, they are good candidates to be lured back to the chapter because the reason for their dropping out may have long since disappeared. If you know a previous member, call him, you could be surprised at the response that you get.

There is another area which should be explored and that is SUSPENDED MEMBERS. These are members whose dues have lapsed within the last six months. A monthly list is generated by Kenosha and may be accessed on the 'members only' page of the Society website. Do you know a member who has not been in attendance for a while? Talk to your Membership VP; this absentee should be called to find out why he is no longer coming to chapter meetings. Offer to make the call yourself; help is always welcomed by your officers.

We all need to be proactive when it comes to adding or retaining membership. No one is going to do it for us and there are no magic bullets. With <u>your</u> help, JAD could turn the corner in '06 and have the first positive membership year in a very long time.

Making it part of the program

Younger members have choruses singing barbershop at their universities

pril 2005 on the campus of Capital University brought about something the community had not experienced for many decades. After a full semester of student-led rehearsals, planning, and a healthy dose of optimism, the newly established Capital Chordsmen Men's Chorus made its first attempt to introduce barbershop harmony through its premiere spring concert. Nestled in the heart of Columbus, Ohio, Capital University had long held the reputation of a strong undergraduate conservatory of music, complete with opportunities in jazz and compositional studies. Even with such musical diversity, barbershop and fourpart male singing was still something of a great unknown to this small liberal arts community. Amidst a standing ovation and overwhelming support from family and friends, that spring concert marked the first step in what would soon become a collegiate learning experience in the barbershop hobby.

The dream of revitalizing the male singing community at Capital was once backed by a great amount of history and accomplishment. Since 1906, the Capital

University Glee Club had been performing barbershop throughout Columbus and abroad. A Capital Varsity Quartet was a common appearance alongside the concerts of sacred and secular glee club

The ensemble sings a multitude of genres, including barbershop.

(Continued from page 13) literature. But by the 1980s the alee club had slowed down considerably and was feared gone for good. With the help of BHS members and Capital music education majors Jeffrey Delman and Kyle Zeuch (Greater Central Ohio Chapter), meetings in fall of 2005 helped gain faculty approval for an experiment in a student produced men's ensemble named the Capital Chordsmen.

"It's hard to pick a favorite song," freshman Chordsmen member Brian Lander said during a break in rehearsal. "I had never sung barbershop before coming into the group, and it's proved

to be a big musical eye opener for me." A double major in engineering and computer science, Lander uses the Chordsmen as an opportunity to get away from his studies every Sunday evening and have fun singing in the barbershop style. The group just finished up another successful year complete with singing the national anthem at an MLS Columbus Crew game, participating in a campus opera production, and staging a variety show that brought about record attendance on campus.

Introducing their new chorus to barbershop was easy for Delman and Zeuch. Both are current members of the **Alliance Chorus** under the direction of Dave Calland, and quickly found guidance among their society brothers. Carl Cash

Success Tips for student Barbershoppers

Scheduling- Be Sure to plan out everything before jumping into something. Starting an organized chorus can be overwhelming and stressful. With planning, you will be able to focus more on the music and less on logistics

USE your resources- Between the BHS and local barbershop chapters, there are barbershoppers that will help you get something started. Use them as much as you can.

Communicate- Communication is essential with administrators and faculty. The more you communicate the better.

Contact- Publicity is a big part of getting people to come to concerts. Even if funds are low, spending money on nice posters or a radio announcement will pay off. Easy ways to publicize are through your local barbershop chapter.

Energize the guys- You have to give the members some bait to chomp at. By bringing in talented quartets and singing fun music, the chorus members will be hooked.

Sing- Singing for any opportunity that is given will give your new ensemble exposure and experience. Exposure and experience leads to more members and better singing.

Social events- Plan social events for chorus members to unwind and relax. Bonding with chorus members outside of rehearsal builds trust, camaraderie, and memories. Also, these are great times for tag singing!

(tenor of *U Bet!*) and internationally ranked collegiate quartet 4-Way Stop both helped inspire the Capital Chordsmen during the first few rehearsals. Clinicians from the Alliance music team also helped throughout the year, and the two young directors found a constant source of inspiration from their weekly experiences with Alliance. The two spared no expense in showing the Chordsmen every aspect of our great hobby. Tag singing prior to rehearsals, afterglow experiences. and some classic barbershop favorites were introduced into the ensemble's repertoire at an early start. The Chordsmen

dabbled in stage choreography, and continued to use music educational resources from the society to help promote healthy male singing.

Guest quartets have filled Chordsmen concerts throughout the group's short history. "One of the coolest moments was watching the guys before our spring variety show react to our quartet," Delman recalls. "We were in the middle of rehearsing our set and all I could think about was how new this must sound to so many of the guys. It was a really cool step forward." The occurrence of including barbershop into the collegiate experience is happening more than just in Columbus Ohio. Arjun Chandy, member of the **Vocal Majority**, has started a small barbershop

At the end of the 2005-2006 school year the Capital Chordsmen were

recognized by the Dean of the conservatory at Capital University by making the ensemble an official credit bearing ensemble that will be at Capital to stay. With the help

of the Barbershop Harmony Society and a grateful interest by Capital Men's Glee Alumni, the Capital Chordsmen's future in four-part harmony seems well on its way in reaching the ears of more and more college-age men.

- Fall of 2004- Student directors Jeffrey Delman and Kyle Zeuch meet with Capital University conservatory of music to discuss the possibility of becoming an ensemble on campus.
- January 2005-The Capital Chordsmen have their first rehearsal. Twenty five guys showed up to here an exceptional collegiate quartet, 4-Way Stop and jump into the wonderful world of 4-part male harmony.
- April 2005-The Capital Chordsmen hold their first concert on campus. For the first time in decades, barbershop harmony is shared on Capital University's campus. The sold out crowd and standing ovation prove to be inspiring for the young members of the chorus.
- October 2005- The Capital
 Chordsmen get the opportunity to sing the National Anthem in front of a sold out crowd at a Columbus Crew Major

- League soccer game. This was an experience that none of us will ever forget.
- November 2005-The Chordsmen perform as an all male chorus in a Gilbert and Sullivan opera review hosted by the conservatory of music. The chorus members did everything from makeup to dancing.
- February 2006- The Capital
 Chordsmen put on a Variety Show on campus that included everything from barbershop to bagpipes. The record attendance and great success gained more success from administrators and faculty.
- March 2006- The Capital Chordsmen continue to perform on other events around campus including board of trustees meetings and chapel services.

By the time you read this, the registrations for Divisional will be in full swing. If you have not done so already, just go to the Members Only section of the Society web site, scroll down to Contest and Judging and select Contest Entry. From there just select JAD and the contest you wish to enter. If you have trouble registering, contact Rick Spencer at: rspencer@barbershop.org or 800-876-7464 ext 8559. Here are some tips to help your chorus or quartet register with ease.

Prepare for registration by gathering Song Title, arranger and who wrote the words and music. If the song has a society stock number, please have it handy, too. All songs done in contest **must be legal arrangements**. The first portion of the registration form explains in detail exactly what you will need, so I will not attempt to list everything here.

One thing new this fall is that the Contest Administrator now has the ability to go in and pull down the song title list. This makes it easier for him to not have to search through unfamiliar song titles during the contest. Please be certain to list any and all possible songs you may sing.

Don't forget registrations close 14 days prior to the start of a contest. So, for Western Divisional you have until August 25th, Eastern Divisional you have until September 1st and for District, you will have until October 6th.

Since I'm on the subject of registrations, please be reminded that any quartet or chorus is not fully registered until I have a check for fees. The fee of \$25/man must be in my hands by the close of registration. So, when you go to the Society web site to register, have your checkbook ready. That way you won't forget and I won't hassle you. THEN WHAT?

When a member does not pay his dues on time, he is transferred to the 'suspended members' list where his name remains for six months. What can JAD do to strengthen your Music Team?









absolutely necessary to the health of a chapter. In fact, as the music team goes, so goes the chapter. We have several programs to help develop the skills of the music team. The two primary ones are The CDWI and Director of the Future. Let me talk about them in more detail, and urge you to take advantage of them both.

CDWI

The CDWI is probably the best known, yet there are still some misunderstandings about it. The purpose of the CDWI, as most of you know, is to work with the front line director and help him, or her work on two skills. It focuses on two and only two. skills that are selected by the director. It is intensive, one on one, teaching/ coaching session in front of a live chorus conducted by certified trainers who themselves have undergone extensive training. The CDWI also helps the director better understand his or her role as the director of his or her individual chorus and his or her relationship with the chorus. It is very individualized, hands on, one on one training.

A common misconception is that the more experienced director need not take the CDWI-1 but can go directly to the CDWI-2. --NOT SO!-- The CDWI 1 helps the individual director understand his or her personal philosophy, goals, and roles within the home chapter. Everything that follows in the CDWI program, CDWI-1, CDWI-2, and Next Level, are based on that understanding. Work on the two skills is the same regardless of the CDWI-1 or CDWI-2.

That speaks to another misconception. A number of directors have said, "I've already had a CDWI-1 and 2." Well, that means they have worked on four directing skills. I would submit that there are more than four

skills that a director could develop, and I know from experience, that even the skills on which I have been coached, there is room for even more improvement once I have mastered those initial concepts. The CDWI-2 is a program that can help you grow and improve as long as you are a director who does not yet know everything.

Director of the Future (DoF)

The DoF program, as its name implies, helps develop skills for those who may want to consider being the "guy up front" some day. It works on hand skills, leadership, coaching, planning, sound management, and communication skills. DoF uses the trainees as the chorus so it is best to have at least 4 to 6 people in a class, although all four parts are not necessary for a productive session.

DoF is a great way to develop your associate directors, but consider this. What if all of your section leaders had a better handle on their hand skills, leadership, coaching, planning, sound management, and communication skills as well? This can bring a number of strengths to your music team. First it would provide a lot more support to the director to help avoid burn out. Secondly, it would help the associate directors be prepared to do a better job when the director can not be up front for rehearsal or Thirdly, it would help the performance. section leaders run more effective section rehearsals. Fourthly, it would help your entire music team bring a more consistent program to your chorus.

SINGING BUCKEYES AND COLUMBUS SWEET ADELINES TEAM UP TO HELP CHORUS FROM MISSOURI

On July 31, the Singing Buckeyes and the Columbus Chorus of Sweet Adelines International were treated to a performance by a terrific group of young people, the New Generation Singers from St. Joseph, Missouri. In turn, the "New G" and their support family were treated to some Columbus barbershop hospitality.



The New Generation Singers are 82 young men and women, ranging in age from 13 to 21, who profess their Christian faith through song. The "home" church for New G is Ashland United Methodist in St. Joseph, but the members of the chorus represent a number of different denominations, including Methodist, Lutheran, Catholic, Presbyterian, United Church of Christ, Baptist, Disciples of Christ and Greek Orthodox.

The New Generation Singers were started in 1970 by Byron Myers, Sr. and his wife Phyllis. Byron, former director of the American Barberboys Chorus (now known as the Voices of America) and current BHS Central States District President, directed the New G until 1998. The New Generation Singers are now directed by Byron's son,

Byron "Bemo" Myers II. Bemo also now directs the Voices of America.

In late July, the New G was getting ready for its 2006 Summer Tour, a series of 14 performances at churches in Missouri, Ohio, New York, Connecticut and Pennsylvania over a 15 day period. The group's first concert outside of Missouri was scheduled at a church in Columbus, Monday evening July 31. On extremely short notice, the church had to cancel the event. Suddenly, the New Generation Singers had lost not only a performance venue, but also overnight housing for more than 80 chorus members and supporters on the very first leg of their tour.

After unsuccessfully attempting to schedule a substitute performance at a number of Columbus area churches, Byron Sr. contacted the Singing Buckeyes' Gary Wulf. Gary then got in touch with the Columbus Chorus of Sweet Adelines. The Buckeyes and the Columbus Chorus share the same rehearsal location, Mountview Baptist Church in Upper Arlington, the Buckeyes practicing Tuesday evenings and the Columbus Chorus Monday evenings. The Columbus Chorus readily agreed to help the Singing Buckeyes house the New Generation Singers with Chorus members, and to give up a rehearsal night so that the New G could perform at the church on July 31.

The New Generation Singers arrived in Columbus Monday evening after an exhausting all day bus ride that included an unfortunate incident when one of their bus drivers was attacked and robbed during a rest stop in Indiana. The Singers may have been tired and emotionally drained, but one would never have suspected once they got

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in costume, set up and began singing. Accompanied on piano, drums and bass guitar, the New Generation Singers performed their full musical set for an appreciative au-



by individual chorus members. Everyone in the enthusiastic audience was thrilled and moved by the stellar singing of this extraordinary group of young men and women.

Following the New Generation Singers' performance, the Columbus Chorus entertained the crowd with several selections, demonstrating why they are the SAI Region 4 2006 Champion Mid-Size Chorus. After snacks and socializing, the New G Singers went home with their various Columbus hosts for some well deserved rest (but probably not before a few tags). All in all, it was an evening that a chorus from Missouri and barbershoppers from Columbus won't soon forget.
