




f you were at the Spring Conven-L tion Chorus Contest on Saturday and left immediately after the competition or if you were not at the Spring Convention at all – you missed a good High School Quartet Contest and a GREAT performance from the Heights Barbershoppers from Cleveland Heights High School! There were 10 registered HS Quartets and the boys contest was won by *The Amherst Varsity* Singers from Amherst, Ohio and the girls contest was won by Those One Chicks from Toledo Whitmer High School in Toledo, Ohio. By finishing first, the quartets received a trophy and 100% paid scholarships to attend a Harmony Camp of their choice in the JAD. Second place finishers received a trophy and 75% paid scholarships and third place received 50% paid scholarships.



The highlight of the afternoon was

the performance by the Cleveland Heights singers, the Heights Barbershoppers, who performed four songs without a director on stage. This group of 18 high school boys thrilled the audience and received several standing ovations. A plaque was presented to the vocal department of Cleveland Heights HS and their director, Mr. Craig McGaughey for their contribution for promoting Barbershop Singing throughout the state and to the O.M.E.A. recently in Cincinnati, Ohio. The Cleveland East Chapter was also presented a certificate of appreciation for their involvement in taking the "gospel of barbershop" to the Cleveland Heights HS and supporting several students with scholarships to Harmony Camp. Last year there were 23 students from Cleveland Heights HS who attended the Buckeye Harmony Camp!

he JAD Events Team is seeking convention sites for the 2011, 2012, and 2013 Spring Convention that includes the District Chorus Plateau and International Quartet Preliminary contests. Based on the latest convention in Olmstead Falls (nee Cleveland), we need about 200 hotel rooms located within a 10-15 minute drive of a venue that will seat 850 to 1000. Pluses for site consideration include an area to set up a Registration area and Harmony Marketplace in the contest venue as well as a concession area for our hungry conventioneers. If you know of a city with these attributes, please contact either Convention Manager Steve Sommer (steve@caldwellleasing.com) or me at skropp@jacksonkelly.com and let us know your candidate site. We would especially like to know about sites in central or southwestern Ohio, and we haven't been to Pittsburgh in forever, either. Once we get the hotel and venue information, we'll take care of the site investigation and price negotiations, so get busy looking and shoot us an email!

We are also looking for 2012, 2013, and 2014 Fall Convention sites. The new Fall convention format includes the District Quartet Championship and International Chorus Preliminary contests. We typically need about 150 hotel rooms and a venue with 700 seats for the Fall convention. We had a great convention in Lima in 2009 and are expecting two more terrific conventions there in October of 2010 and 2011, so we're looking for

central of southwestern Ohio or Pittsburgh area sites for future Fall conventions as well.

If you know of any likely candidate sites, please let us know. Johnny Appleseed District spent a few "dark" years during which our attendance was changing at every convention and we weren't able to plan site requirements with any certainty, but with the revision of the convention formats in 2008, we have been experiencing greater, but more predictable attendance, and that allows us to make plans farther out than the next six months.

By the way, the Cleveland area convention was terrific and, if vou haven't attended a convention in a while, you should do yourself the favor of making the next one! In Cleveland, we honored the late Bud Deunk's Lorain Chapter for its unprecedented contributions to Youth in Harmony, sponsoring 65 youth to the Buckeye Harmony Camp in 2009 with contributions of over \$12,000! We also had a terrific high school quartet contest and celebrated the Cleveland Heights High School barbershop program. We included a Harmony marketplace for all your barbershop shopping needs without having to pay shipping, and topped everything off with a freshly renovated Marriott hotel as headquarters (and at an \$89 room rate, to boot). As you can see, our conventions are the places to be in JAD, and I promise you won't go wrong in attending the next one in Lima.

PR Toolbox - Public Relations and perception

"Perception has very little to do with truth barbershop in general perceived in your When a person comes in contact with baror fact, but perception is indeed reality." Or another way to say it is that people react to how they perceive things rather than the truth of the situation.

Let me give you an example...You're walking in the woods when all of a sudden, about 30 yards ahead of you a big bear stands up on its hind legs and growls. You turn and run! When you have run about 10 yards, you hear laughter behind you. You stop and turn around only to find that there is a man in a bear suit laughing at you. You reacted to what you perceived to be true rather than what was, in fact, true.

example has to do with barbershop marketing and public relations. My question to you might be "How is your chapter and "Oh yeah, they're great."

community?"

The definition of public relations is the business of inducing the public to have understanding for and goodwill toward a person, firm, or institution; also the degree of understanding and goodwill achieved. Although it primarily is the job of the person in your chapter designated as the Marketing and PR person, the perception of barbershop and of your chapter falls on the shoulders of every member of your chapter. How do you measure what the perception of your chapter may be? Talk to a stranger and ask the question "Have you Now you're asking yourself, what this ever heard of (name of your chorus)? You barbershop singing. may be surprised at the answers...anything from "Who" to "What" to "I think so," to

bershop for the first time, he or she will walk away with a perception of "so that's what barbershop is." You can impact the perception of your chapter and barbershop in general by always exhibiting pride in your organization, displaying a positive attitude and making visitors feel welcome at the chapter meetings. Of course, working hard to improve the vocal production of your chorus goes a long way in impressing your audience.

es, you gotta' know that the youth of today *are* latching on to barbershop harmony! It was ever so evident at the 15th annual, Singing Buckeye Harmony Camp held this past August for four days on the Ohio State University campus in Columbus, OH, attended by 304 high school stu-

dents from Ohio and five other states. Of that number, 43% (131) were young men, and 57% (173) were young women, a gender percentage of which many choral directors would be envious! The campers came from 94 different public and parochial schools, in addition to 16 home-schooled students.

Cleveland Heights High School had 23 campers in attendance, many of them minority students. Their choral director, Craig McGaughey, sent us a follow up letter thanking the Cleveland East BHS chapter and the camp ad-

ministration for the many scholarships needed to get his students to the camp. Having seen the campers perform, he added "I have been a music educator for over 20 years and such bliss from 300 plus teenagers is rare. My students who attended Harmony Camp cannot wait to go back and already, because of their excitement, many more want to go to camp."

Then in January, at the Ohio Music Educators Association conference, Craig conducted a class on the value barbershop harmony has played in his choral groups in terms of male participation and quality performance issues. His barbershop ensemble also performed at a separate event, and yes indeed, 7 of their 8 songs were barbershop arrangements!

The "Stars of the Night" show held at the Veteran's Memorial Auditorium in Columbus was exceptionally well attended, which

we attribute a great deal to the word getting out that seeing and hearing the Harmony Camp performances should not be missed. When the young men's chorus closed their portion of the program with Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho, the ceiling structure of the Vet was stressed! As

usual, directors Gary Lewis and Jenn **Perry** had their campers in excellent form and every barbershopper in the audience knew that barbershop harmony is going to go on and on. Of course, having the Singing Buckeye Chorus, a special chorus of central Ohio BHS members, SAI medalist quartet Capri, and BHS gold medalist quartet Crossroads assured the audience of a great show. It is to be noted that Capri and Crossroads performed for expenses only. How kind is that?

We were honored to have Clark Caldwell and Ryan Kileen from the BHS Harmony Foundation at camp this year and follow-

ing the show, their reaction was simply stated as, WOW! But best of all, let me close by listing just 6 of the many comments from the campers themselves, as they "tell it like it is".

Thank you for giving me the chance to realize how much I truly love Barbershop.

Harmony Camp has been some of the best days of my life and I am so grateful to the adults that are passing on their love of barbershop.

We appreciate camp more than you know, and whether we attend multiple times or only once, we

leave with renewed love, improved abilities and respect for music and barbershop harmony.

I have loved every minute of camp......I don't believe I well ever quit singing after this!

It's important to keep barbershop alive and expose it to a younger generation, and that's exactly what this camp does. I

> just wish that Harmony Camp was longer! Harmony Camp is, honest to God, my favorite place to be on earth.

At the JAD International Prelims in Cleveland, The Allies, Hot Air Buffoons, ThrillRide and Class Ring all qualified to represent JAD at this summer's International Contest in Philadelphia. In addition, four quartets from outside JAD sang for qualifying score only, and they also qualified to represent their own districts: they were Old School, Voce, Lucky Day, and Crunch Time. Wow - SEVEN quartets in this contest scored higher than the 2736-point qualifying score!

Test of Time, who finished 14th overall, became the 2010 JAD Seniors Quartet Champs.

In the collegiate contest, Steel City Incline beat the 1260 qualifying score to win the right to represent JAD in this summer's international collegiate contest.

Congratulations to all of the competitors in this outstanding contest, and our best wishes to those quartets that will represent us in Philadelphia this summer!




























Riser Etiquette – You Can't Avoid It

R iser Etiquette. Not exactly the type of topic that jumps out at you as something that is discussed each week at rehearsal. Yet all of us DO deal with it every week at chapter meetings. You can't avoid it... unless you spend the entire meeting in the uncomfortable metal folding chairs:)

As many of you know I wear multiple hats in the BHS including being a riser guy for both Southern Gateway in Cincinnati and for the Alliance in Columbus. In addition, I have visited numerous chapter meetings both in JAD and out of JAD the last few years. So I have seen numerous versions of "riser etiquette". When I started to research this topic a bit, I ran across the actual written riser etiquette for the 2007 International Chorus Champions – Ambassadors of Harmony. It has some very interesting rules. Is your chapter doing any of these?

Respect the Rehearsal Hall: Refrain from conducting business (chorus or personal) during the rehearsal time. If you absolutely must engage in conversation with someone, please do so outside of the rehearsal room so as not to be a distraction to the group performing on the risers.

Minimize Distractions: While we are performing during rehearsal, please silence all cell phones, pagers, watches and other

personal devices which could serve as a distraction. If such a device is necessary for emergency or on-call reasons, please adjust to "vibrate" mode or do your best to minimize its potential for distraction.

Wait: If you arrive late, or step down from the risers and are returning, simply stand on the side and wait until invited by the Director (or whoever is leading the rehearsal at that point) to take your place.

No Crossing: Under no circumstances should we ever cross in front of the Director while getting on/off the risers. If you are crossing to the far side of the risers, walk behind him or circle behind the ris-

Have Fun: Enjoy performing throughout rehearsal and know that your riser "neighbors" are enjoying the rehearsal because of your level of focus. Keep your focus and attention on the director/coach in front of the chorus at all times and save your fun with your neighbor until after the rehearsal.

Listen, Don't Hum: When the pitch pipe is sounding, don't hum the pitch. It keeps you and everyone else from hearing the pitch accurately.

Listen, Don't Fix: Often when there's a

pause, chorus members try to correct their mistakes or those of their neighbors. Although this may seem important, RESIST. You will miss important comments from the Director or coaches that affect everyone in the chorus. Bear in mind that the Director and coaches fixes problems in the order which they feel is most appropriate. Stay focused on them and they will eventually get to the area which is bugging you!

Listen, Don't Sing: When the Director is demonstrating how to sing a particular passage, do not sing with him. He's usually doing that to demonstrate the interpretive plan, language, tuning or certain effect that he wants for a particular phrase. If you sing with him, you keep yourself and many of those around you from hearing him, thus hindering our progress.

Perform At All Times: When the Director is working with another section or more than one section, silently (without singing your part) perform with them. This allows you to stay focused and involved, and you will benefit from 'active' learning.

So think about the preceding list for just a moment. Could your chapter meeting be improved by implementing just ONE of the above rules you are not currently do-



Tow that the spring 2010 JAD competition is over, and hopefully the nasty winter of 2010 as well, it is time to consider what is next on the CSLT agenda. Following another very successful Leadership Academy (LeadAc) in January with about 200 JAD Chapter leaders in attendance we must now look at the remainder of 2010. Many of those same Chapter leaders were at the House of Delegates (HOD) meeting on Friday April 9th in Cleveland and heard about the plans your JAD leadership team has scheduled for the rest of this year.

All district officers generally serve for one two year term, at the pleasure of the District President. David Calland and many of us are due to be rotated or replaced by the next crop of outstanding district leaders next January. We are all looking for just the right person to take over our positions and lead this great district to new and even more challenging goals. That task is called, 'succession planning' and every district, chapter and society officer has the responsibility to all of their members to choose that next leader carefully. The role of the VP-CSLT is to help prepare those 'next generation leaders' for positions of increasing importance and responsibility. Our primary tool is the old Chapter Officer Training Schools (COTS) and the new Leadership Academies (LeadAc). Your local chapter's normally recruit their chapter leaders from among their own membership. Many men have some previous skills in the office they are recruited to serve, but many if not most do not. That is why it is so important to send your new officers to LeadAc. Maybe even more important yet, the current chapter leaders must identify future leaders within their ranks and encourage them to attend LeadAc too!

Another task I have set for myself in 2010 will be an effort to determine whether the position of the 'District Chapter Counselor' should be continued; as in the past, consolidated into the responsibilities of the other District Officers or simply eliminated altogether. If the Chapter Counselor program is to survive in its current form then I must begin recruiting 10 to 18 new 'CC' candidates from all parts of the District. I'll do that by contacting, by email, every chapter president, current chapter counselor and the District leaders to ask them to nominate men who have served previously as chapter presidents, JAD Officers or other well experienced JAD members and who they feel would make a good counselor. Those men will become our new CC candidates. I will advise Steve Wyszomierski to either set up a special two day CC training seminar or to add an intense CC track to the LeadAc syllabus for 2011 so we may qualify new CC's and also re-qualify our current family of JAD CC's.

By the way, the firm date for the 2011 LeadAc is Friday evening and Saturday, 14-15 January 2011. Write those dates in your calendars now so you don't plan anything else that weekend. It will be held at the DoubleTree Hotel in Worthington, Ohio. We hope LeadAc 2011 will be even larger and more successful than the one in January. The early plan is to structure the classes and times very similarly to what we did last January.


