Build a Chapter or Quartet Website - Free & Easy!







Free... Really? Yes! If you don't need some of those fancy bells and whictles that professional some of those fancy bells and whistles that professional website developers provide, you can build a great looking website for FREE.

Easy... Really? Yes! Well, OK, it's not that easy for some of us chronologically-gifted barbershoppers, but for a chapter member or friend who knows his way around a mouse, it's a breeze.

In a previous article I discussed the value of Social Media as marketing tools for our hobby. Social Media provide free and effective marketing opportunities, but what about the good old website? A website is still the best place to host information about your chorus or quartet, and every JAD chapter and quartet should have one.

This article is primarily for those JAD chapters who do not have websites, and for our many quartets who think they can't afford a website. If you already have a website and feel it could look better or be used more effectively, this article is also for you. What was once considered by most of us to be "too technical" has become very easy in recent years. There are really only two things you need for a website – a hosting service and content.

Hosting:

If you want a personalized web address like www.menofindependence.com or www.singingbuckeyes.com, it will cost you a modest amount of money, about \$60 per year for web hosting and a personalized domain name. But if you don't mind having your chorus name attached to someone else's address, like www.harmonize.com/harmonyline or www.harmonize.com/cascadechordsmen, hosting will cost you nothing. Just visit www.harmonize.com (HDC) and follow the instructions. HDC provides free web space to any barbershop group around the world. More than 200 barbershop websites are hosted by HDC, and it is 100% FREE!

Content:

Designing a basic website became free and easy with the recent advent of "drag and drop" online webpage development services. They all want your money for their top-tier services, but some offer a limited package of development tools for FREE. Two of the more popular services are www.wix.com and www.weebly.com. Most free services are limited to six pages, but that's plenty for a chorus or quartet. Web pages like Home, About Us, Repertoire, Media, Performances and Contact Us are more than enough to market your services. If you need ideas to get you started designing your own website, learn from the best. Just do a search for some of your favorite choruses and quartets and find a design that you like. After all, imitation is the highest form of flattery!

Keep in mind that your website is a passive marketing tool. That is, your target audience has to make a choice to visit your website. By keeping it current and interesting, you will encourage people to return. But, how do you get them there in the first place? The good news is that there are several ways to drive traffic to your website. The better news is that they are also FREE.

Email:

Develop and maintain a distribution group of show patrons and friends of the chorus, and send an email anytime something newsworthy is happening. Be sure to have interesting and detailed information about the event on your website, and put a link to that information in your email.

MailChimp:

www.mailchimp.com is an email marketing service that allows you to send 12,000 emails to up to 2,000 addresses for FREE. Use MailChimp to advertise your next chapter show or performance schedule, and link your reader to your website.

Facebook:

"Share" a brief message about your upcoming event and provide a link to your website for more information.

GigSalad:

Advertise your chorus or quartet for FREE on booking site www.gigsalad.com. If you put a link to GigSalad on your website, GigSalad will reciprocate with a link back to your website.

Now that websites are free and easy, there is no reason to wait. Let's show the online community that all JAD chapters and quartets can be found on the World Wide Web.

MEET OUR APPLE CORPS MEGA MUSIC MAN

Don Campbell is Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Southern Wesleyan University in Central, South Carolina. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in music education from California State University, Fullerton, and his Master of Arts degree in choral conducting from California State University, Fresno, and his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting from Arizona State University. His mentors include David Thorsen, Howard Swan, John Cooksey, Greg Lyne, and many others.

He is recipient of Southern Wesleyan University's Faculty Member of the Year for 2003-4. Additional honors include being recently elected President-Elect in the South Carolina American Choral Directors Association and contributing to Visions of Excellence: a Dialog with the Finest Directors from the Barbershop Harmony Society.

Active in barbershopping, Dr. Campbell has directed Visalia, California's Mighty Oak Chorus, Hanford, California's Kingsmen Chorus, and Spartanburg, South Carolina's Palmetto Statesmen Chorus. He has been on the international faculty for Harmony University of the Barbershop Harmony Society for fifteen years having taught Vocal Techniques, Music Theory, Directing Techniques, Effective Choral Warm-ups, Vocal Pedagogy, Choral Methods, How to Teach What You Know and others.

In demand as a choral clinician, Dr. Campbell has traveled to fourteen states and British Columbia and Ontario, Canada to conduct choirs and festival choruses and present choral clinics. In July of 2012, he traveled to Scotland to work with choirs there. He is the founder and host of four festivals for local school and church choirs at Southern Wesleyan University.


Chorus Directors' Workshop Intensive - CDWI





A Personal Experience







"Barbershop is the best kept secret."

Marty Monson, our newish CEO, dislikes those words with a passion, and at the spring convention House of Delegates meeting in Pittsburgh, he said as much to all of us in attendance. There is no reason we should be a secret, yet for many choruses just knowledge of the existence of our hobby in their local area is a rare thing indeed.

So why is this? We try our best to market ourselves, to invite guests, and to get people to come to our shows - people should know about us by now, right? Unfortunately, they still don't know. I believe it's because we've unwittingly become exclusive.

By "exclusive," I don't mean we're intentionally denying or rejecting potential members, or doing anything malicious or consciously at all. Instead, we've become exclusive because we're not being inclusive enough, and this can show up in a number of ways, and can affect both potential and existing members.

Next time you are tagging with three other guys after practice or at an afterglow, do you ever ask the people standing around listening in if they would like to sing one or two? Not everyone who wants to sing is going to butt in and ask for it. If you're not, I know nothing malicious is meant – we're all just having too good of a time entertaining ourselves to include others.

What about inviting our existing members to events such as Apple Corps? Sure, we stand up in front of our Choruses, and tell everyone how great it is and that they should go. This doesn't cut it in most cases. To get people to do things, from anything to giving money to volunteering, a personal invitation is required. If you know of someone that would benefit from going to Apple Corps, LeadAc, Conventions or even the Corn Roast, they need a personal invitation, not a public announcement.

The same goes for selling tickets for a show. We can buy all the ads and put up all the flyers we want, but tickets are sold by personal interaction with the customer – this is especially true when they don't know we exist, or what we're about.

Going forward, I encourage each and every one of you to have a personal interaction with someone over the next month – whether it be inviting someone who's never been to Apple Corps, personally inviting someone to your chapter meeting or chorus rehearsal face to face, or just telling someone personally how much you enjoy this hobby of ours.
