

- Ask the new guy you have barely spoken to at rehearsal what HE does for a living
- ✓ Volunteer for just ONE more job at your chapter... no matter how small.

Any of these items above can allow you to enjoy barbershop with your fellow peers just a little bit more. You can make a difference in someone's life. And when all is said and done... isn't this what life really is all about? \$\mathcal{I}\$

# **Does Anyone Have Any Questions?**

It was a great lesson if I say so myself. Even if the topic was so boring as reflexive and intensive pronouns, I had figured out a creative way to get the message across. And when I presented it to the students, I felt confident the message was conveyed. And then, as has been the customary close to each of my English lessons for the past 34 years, I said, "Does anyone have any questions?"

OK. I was the first to admit the lesson was good. The lesson was also creative. But surely out of everyone in the room, I wasn't able to teach to such a level that absolutely everyone understood to such an extent that they had no questions. Sadly, the deafening silence to my question has occurred at the close of virtually all of my lessons over the years.

Nobody has any questions. Hardly

And then the next step in the sequence is some form of assessment. And many of those who seem to never raise their hands are the ones who struggle through the exam. And it frustrates me to no end. Seek the help. Ask and learn.

Much of the same pattern exists within our barbershop chapters these days. No matter the resources available...no matter the new and creative vehicles to claim those resources....no matter the leadership pool available to assist with those resources and materials or even handson approaches.....no matter what is out there......no one calls. No one asks questions.

The Chapter Counseling program has evolved....a lot....over the years. The main reason for its evolution is to attempt to find that new way.....that

new hook...that will cause the chapters to seek assistance. Recently, the program has evolved into a Chapter Support and Resource program, a program that enlists the specialists within a District and creates a resource manual covering virtually every topic of administration and musical needs of a chapter's success. The Far Western District has produced a five-page resource manual of topics and the contact information for the specialist in that area. It is a beautiful document indeed.

To date, only two or three chapters....let's say individuals....have initiated a call for assistance. And that's the Far Western District. Isn't the Far Western District.....far? And if I'm not mistaken it's out West somewhere as well. Aren't there a lot of people living out there? Shouldn't there be a lot more questions?

Not only has the Far Western District assembled quite the valuable resource manual, but so many other districts boast the same resource library to their chapters....Johnny Appleseed included. And the Society itself has on its website an ever-breathing library of leadership, administrative, and musical tools at the ready. The curriculum that supports these topics is updated on a regular basis to meet the needs of the chapters as time presses on.

I mentioned in the last *Cider Press* that the initiative before us as a District leadership team was to study what the latest trends in Society support are and to adjust our own District chapter support and leadership program to garner the best results. Tweaking what we already have is the easy part. The challenge before us as leaders in the District is to infiltrate

the minds of the chapters and determine what it will take for the chapters to initiate...make the call.....ASK THE QUESTIONS that set the resources and talent of our District into motion to help them.

Several years ago, I was part of a Society committee that contacted some 100 chapters at random...chapters from all the various types. Our mission was to read through a list of 25 or so items of concern and ask that chapter leader select any five of them where the Society could help them out the most. In three out of the 10 chapters on my list to contact, the chapter representative, after hearing my speech, said for me to select the five items. How do I know what a chapter in North Dakota or Iowa needs? I don't even know where those states are. Is that the Far Western District or is it even farther away than that? But that does beg the question that maybe the chapters themselves don't know what questions to ask.

As District leaders we will try to answer the questions before us. Questions such as: What new content do we need to include for the chapters? What can we do to make our resources more easily accessible to our chapters? How can we reach out in different ways to be there for chapters to be successful? In the meantime, all that is needed from the chapter leadership is to .... Ask a question....See what the teachers can do to help you understand a little better. Just make sure you raise your hand first!





# Book Review | Johnny Appleseed: Legendary figure was complicated (and a little nutty), fascinating new biography suggests

Johnny Appleseed - or, as he was actually christened, John Chapman - made do with cider mill leavings to plant the orchards that turned him into a myth. Biographer Howard Means turns equally scanty and questionable his-

torical material into a surprising and exhilarating story about a man who was a walking contradiction and about the ways that his story has been distorted through the years.

Chapman was born in Massachusetts in 1774, the son of a soldier in the American Revolution and a mother who died when John was 2. When he was in his teens, he headed west - first

for Pennsylvania, then across the Ohio River.

Here, he planted the seedling orchards that would later make him famous. He traveled barefoot from settlement to settlement, amusing children by sticking pins in his feet or walking barefoot over red-hot coals. He wore "a pyramid of three hats" - a simple brim, a cooking pot and a hat with a crown. But he was also an ambitious speculator in land, albeit too generous, impatient and negligent to be successful. When he entered the territory that would become central Ohio, he encountered "a massive real-estate event in the offing," and he began buying up land in the hopes of selling it at a rapid rate. If he hadn't given much of it away - and if he hadn't lost even more because he didn't bother to pay taxes or interest - he might have ended up a wealthy man.

Most important to Chapman, though, was his role as a missionary. He was

devoted to the works of Emanuel Swedenborg, a Swedish scientist turned spiritualist and communicator with angels. Chapman would often greet skeptical settlers with passages from Swedenborg's voluminous writings -"news right fresh from heaven" and would tear apart his books so that each family could have a few pages to read. Chapman, Means

says, operated with a "transitory, highvolume, pile-'em-high-and-watch-'emfly business model" - planting trees that produced "mostly puny, sour little apples." But the settlers didn't care: Most of the apples went to produce hard cider.

"Not to overstate the case, but life on the edge of civilization in the old Northwest Territory was often lived through an alcoholic haze," Means says. Ohioans 15 and older consumed 30 gallons of hard cider a year.

Means' Johnny was no saint. In fact, he was, "by our modern definition, almost certainly insane," and, as he aged, he turned into a crabby crackpot unable to stand those who didn't go along with his religious theories. He became so

ridden with lice that most people were unwilling to let him enter their homes. But Means maintains enormous affection for him - as a generous, if quirky, spirit and as a person who lived the free life in America's woods about which his younger contemporary, Thoreau, romanticized.

In Means' biography, Chapman comes across as a man far more interesting and complicated than the cliches about

# **Every Member an Ambassador!**

here is an **Alliance** afoot, and I'm not just talking about our JAD championship chorus. I'm referring to the inseparable link between **Membership** and **Market**ing.

We all know about the importance of "marketing for membership." We use all sorts of traditional marketing tools to reach out to potential chorus singers — radio spots, yard signs and bumper stickers to name a few. But, what about "membership for marketing?" We should also expect each member of our society to be a virtual member of his chapter's marketing team, and equip him with the tools he needs to be effective. I believe that, to successfully increase your chapter's penetration into new markets, you must outfit each member with the knowledge, tools, and

confidence to talk about barbershop every time he has an opportunity.

Here are a few ideas that any chapter can implement immediately, at little or no cost, that will increase the probability of gaining access to new show patrons and members.

- □ Carry your music. I used to eat lunch by myself most days. Rather than sit at my desk, I would go to a local restaurant or park bench, and study my music between bites. Servers, restaurant managers, patrons and passersby would often ask what I was doing. What a great way to start a dialog about our hobby, invite them to our next show, or assess their interest in singing! Keep your music accessible at all times. It's a great conversation starter.
- Wear your chapter's logo. If you don't have a chapter shirt, jacket, hat, lapel pin, or some other form of wearable chorus identification, you should consider investing in some. I know of no better way to steer a conversation toward barbershopping than to have something on your person that begs to be discussed. Strangers look for things to talk about in first meetings. Give them what they're looking for.
- Use an "active" business card. Traditional business cards are "passive." You give one to your "target,"

and then hope that he has enough interest to respond to you at a later date. An "active" business card gives you a tool to gather basic information about the "target." Your chapter's Marketing VP or Membership VP can then follow up in person. Below is a sample of a two-part "active" business card that is used by the Southern Gateway Chorus. The chorus member (known in Southern Gateway as a "Membership and Marketing Ambassador") writes the person's name and contact information on one half of the two-part card, then separates it at the perforated center – keeping the gathered information. The "target" person still gets his "passive" business card, but the chapter now has enough information about him to make an "active" contact.



These are just a few ideas to get you started. If you would like to talk in person about creating Membership and Marketing Ambassadors in your chapter, please give me a call.

All in all, this was one of my favorite and most memorable conventions. I hope to see and sing with you all at the next one! 🎜


# Help Support Your Fellow Barbershoppers

- 2. Fundraising at the venue. Most of the time there is an opportunity to set up food and snacks in the lobby of the venue. This will help support your chapter functions throughout the year and allow your chapter to have extra money to promote membership growth.
- 3. The hosting chapter will receive a flat \$2500.00 fee for hosting the convention.
- 4. The publicity of the Convention will help to raise awareness in your local and surrounding communities to promote the art of barbershop singing. This will help in the future when you are working to increase your membership.

The Events Team will assist you in every aspect of hosting a convention.

The Convention performance hall will need a few basic requirements. The main requirement that is the primary factor in determining its feasibility is seating. We do require a minimum of 950 seats in the auditorium. The headquarters hotel also needs to have at least 1 large ballroom that can be divided up and a few suites for hospitality rooms. The minimum numbers of rooms is approximately 125-150 per night. Don't worry about any negotiations with the hotel. The events team will handle everything. We want to make the experience easy for you!

# District Ads Harmony Marketplace at Major Events

If you have attended any of the four major JAD events (LEADAC, Spring International Quartet Prelims and District Chorus Competition, Apple Corps, and Fall District Quartet and International Chorus Preliminary Competition) in the past year, you will have seen a display of Barbershop Harmony Society clothing and other products for sale. The display is a project that is being operated as a service to JAD members by the Past JAD Presidents, lead by Past District President (and resident curmudgeon) Jake Mandator.

Why take the time to operate a JAD Harmony Marketplace, you ask? There are two primary reasons. The first is that many JAD members aren't regular attendees at Society International conventions each year (although you should be...you're missing out on a tremendous week of harmony and camaraderie if you don't go) and have no way to see Society merchandise "in the flesh." The second primary reason for operating a JAD Harmony Marketplace is that JAD members get the benefit of not having to pay shipping costs for their orders. It's not a trivial amount of effort and the JAD Harmony Marketplace profits don't cover all of the "staff" expenses, but the District leadership and the Past District Presidents believe that a the benefits to JAD members of a JAD Harmony Marketplace far outweigh the monetary costs and the time involved to make it happen. We hope that you appreciate being able to get Society merchandise at District events.
